They were yours; you gave them to me and they have obeyed your word. 7 Now they know that everything you have given me comes from you. 8 For I gave them the words you gave me and they accepted them. They knew with certainty that I came from you, and they believed that you sent me. 9 I pray for them. I am not praying for the world, but for those you have given me, for they are yours. 10 All I have is yours, and all you have is mine. And glory has come to me through them. 11 I will remain in the world no longer, but they are still in the world, and I am coming to you. Holy Father, protect them by the power of your name, the name you gave me, so that they may be one as we are one.

Reflection:

Jesus said: 'Father, the hour has come. Glorify your Son, that your Son may glorify you.' Glorifying God means valuing Him for who He really is. Therefore, "glorifying your Son, that your Son may glorify you" personally acknowledges God in His true character. Jesus knows his time on earth is up. That now is the time to hand over the reins to his disciples, to allow them to continue his work that he has prepared them for. But before doing so, Jesus lifts up a final, private prayer to God. Prayer not intended for the world, but as a petition to protect the disciples in their forthcoming work. Jesus prays for them to be kept faithful, so they may be as one with God, "as I am with you, Father." In this way the disciples may glorify God, living in eternal life; knowing that God is the one true God, with Jesus Christ whom he sent, now too living in eternal glory.

Jesus continues: For I gave them the words you gave me, and they accepted them. They knew with certainty that I came from you, and they believed that you sent me. They are ready to spread the love I showed to others, to tell of the work you sent me to do and which I believe I have fulfilled. 'All I have is yours, and all you have is mine.' By this Jesus proclaims that nothing can be hidden from God and that we receive all by giving all.

We are the modern disciples, following in the footsteps of those first twelve: stepping out into an uncertain future, despised and mistreated by people who didn't care to hear the word of God. People who were happy with the status quo, happy to accept teachings given them by Jewish law makers. Alike in our own world to those people happy to accept the first news story on social media that catches their eye, whether fact or fiction. We the modern disciples, like those first twelve, whom are cared and nurtured by the Holy Spirit, who breathes over us and showers us with God's protection day-by-day. We modern disciples who are tasked with carrying on Jesus'

work; spreading the good news of the Father in heaven, who loves all people no matter where they come from, or what they currently believe in. It is up to us to tell all we meet, sometimes in silence through our actions alone, of the wonders of God's Holy name. Praising God and in doing so Lord, bringing others closer to your glory.

As Jesus prayed, so must we: Lord God, we are blessed to live in your created world and thank you for being part of our lives. Show us your true form through your Son, Jesus Christ, with the support of the Holy Spirit.

Amen.

Lord, through the Holy Spirit help us to know you; to know God the Father, the only true God. This is our route to eternal life. Lead us then Lord to you and the Father through your Word. As you pray for us may we pray for those you have sent to us — those whom we will journey with. And, now Lord, protect us by the power of your name and keep us safe this day and in the days to come. Amen
